
REPORT ON ANSE BOARD MEETING 60
RIGA, OCTOBER 24th – 27th , 2013

In a pleasant mood the ANSE Board convened in Riga with members and board of the Latvian Association of Supervisors - recently awarded full ANSE membership - and attended a successful and stimulating local conference on supervision. We even had the pleasure to contribute a little bit to the program by way of a short key note on the work of ANSE and a workshop on control supervision. We are grateful for the kind and hospitable way in which we were welcomed, and cherish pleasant memories of the way we were guided through the many attractions of the fine city of Riga.

But there also was board work to be done. The board dedicated most of its BM 60 to three topics. To start with, the first steps in planning the ANSE Research Conference 2014 in Budapest were taken. Secondly, the board carefully monitored the course of the ECVision Project, and in the third place ample attention was given to relations with sister organisations; more specifically the EASC.

In the case of the ANSE Research Conference, which is to be staged from November 28 through to November 30, 2014 in Budapest, a number of logistic and organisational decisions were taken and a general outline of the aims and the design of the program was delineated. The board decided to launch a formal announcement, asking national organisations to supply information on supervision and coaching related research in their countries and to come up with suggestions for key notes and workshops. Board members Eva Nemes and Sijtze de Roos were appointed to instigate and follow (the local) organisation and to manage the ANSE contribution to it.

With regards to the ECVision Project, the board was happy to note that some potentially harmful administrative problems had in the meantime been tackled successfully, and that the program after some hiccups now was well under way again.

An integral part of ANSE policy are the relations with sister organisations. Recently, relations with EASC improved considerably and resulted in their request to meet and discuss possibilities for co-operation. The board decided to stage a meeting to that effect in Vienna, next January, and spent time in preparing for it.

Lastly: the usual scan of member countries informed the board of structural and organisational changes in a number of national organisations, notably in Hungary – the restructuring of the MSCT is well under way – Norway and Italy (South Tyrol). The board finally decided to stage its next meeting – BM 61 – in Vienna on January 10 – 12, 2014
